Since the time of our last report, multiple projects have been started and/or completed at the Muscatine County Jail. A complete replacement/upgrade of the facility surveillance camera system has been completed. Both the security door control system and fire panel control system are slated to be replaced in the coming months. It should be noted that all these systems were original to the facility when it was opened in 1996. I would be remiss if I did not thank the Jail Division staff for their dedication and professionalism as these projects cause a disruption in day to day operations.

Constant and consistent improvements to training and equipment have been a goal since taking office. With the dedication and motivation of the staff, those improvements are being met. With a cross of hands on training, internet-based training, policy training, and improvements to field training in both the patrol and jail divisions, the staff that makes up the Muscatine County Sheriff's Office has never been better trained.

Some of the challenges in the past year are the same as every household and business in our county, state, and country have faced. Higher prices, supply chain delays, and staffing issues present daily challenges in an operation that runs 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. Rest assured, the Muscatine County Sheriff's Office continues to move forward. As always, our mission, first and foremost, is the safety and security of the lives and property of the citizens of Muscatine County.

As you review this report, I hope you recognize the impact our staff's efforts have on our community and share the level of pride that I have in this organization.


Excellence in Service

Congratulations CO Martinez on a job well done.





Sex Offender Registry

The Muscatine County Sheriff's Office has the duty to facilitate and maintain the registrations of sex offenders residing or employed in Muscatine County.

Currently there are **101** registered sex offenders in Muscatine County. In 2022, we made **31** arrests for registrants failing to comply with the Iowa Sex Offender Registry Requirements. Over the past year, the Criminal Investigation Division has changed with new faces now investigating felony level crimes and maintaining the Sex Offender Registry.

Detective Jacob McCleary, who was recently promoted and is now the Sergeant in charge of the division, switched roles after spending nearly 5 years in the Muscatine County Drug Task Force. Most recently, Detective Hailee Polito joined Sgt. McCleary in the CID office as the newest Muscatine County Sheriff's Office Detective. Detective Polito has spent the last several years on patrol but has more than ten (10) years in law enforcement experience and a drive for investigations.

CID also has the responsibilities of property and evidence room management, intelligence gathering and dissemination of critical information, and assisting the other divisions of the Muscatine County Sheriff's Office when needed. Many times, our detectives go outside of the county to work with area law enforcement agencies to further investigate leads as crimes are sometimes committed by subjects who do not reside within the county lines.



The Muscatine County Joint Communications Center (MUSCOM) is the single Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) for Muscatine County. Muscom’s professional, multi-functional dispatchers serve the citizens of Muscatine County along with 17 law enforcement, fire and EMS agencies.

MUSCOM employs a Director EMA/911, Training and Quality Supervisor, 12 Full-time dispatchers and 2 part-time dispatchers. All dispatchers are certified Emergency Medical Dispatchers through the International Academy of Emergency Dispatch and also certified through the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy.

In 2022, our dispatchers handled 69,581 telephone calls with 15,340 of those being on the 911 system. Muscom entered 54,191 calls for service through the year.

Muscom is excited this year to have the opportunity to add Prepared Live to our system. Prepared Live will give the dispatchers the ability to view in-progress events live through the caller’s cell phone camera if they agree to allow us access. Muscom should be set to go live with this program by the beginning of February.

In 2022 the Muscom Board also approved a radio project. We will be transitioning our radio system over the Iowa Statewide Interoperability Communications System (ISICS) which will allow first responders more interoperability across the state. Be on the look out for more information in next years report once the system goes live.

2022 was a very busy year for the Muscatine County Sheriff's Office K9 teams. Deputy Lane serves the community with his K9 partner Neiko and has also recently been given the role of the K9 unit supervisor. Deputy Hallett serves the community with his K9 partner Kevin. Our duo had a very successful 2022. K9 teams train twice a month which includes the Muscatine Police Departments K9's.

MCSO K9 teams were responsible for the seizure of pounds of multiple different narcotics including methamphetamine, marijuana, heroin, and cocaine as well as stolen firearms. The K9 teams had a total of 7 tracks of suspects who had fled on foot with 6 successful finds and 1 being an apprehension.

Our K9 teams visited multiple schools this year to show the community how the K9 teams operate. Neiko and Kevin along with their handlers enjoyed the questions and showing the community their abilities. The Muscatine County Sheriff's Office takes great pride in its K9 program and both teams look forward to more demonstrations in the coming years .


The Muscatine County Sheriff's Office Patrol Division is the backbone of the Sheriff's Office law enforcement function.



As a recipient of the Governor's Traffic Safety Bureau Grant, Muscatine County is provided 750 hours of enforcement overtime for a total of \$38,452.00, one radar and three PBT's and one in car camera system for a total of \$7,350.00 and \$1,000.00 in training. The total grant award of \$46,802.00.



Uniformed deputies respond to calls for service, conduct traffic enforcement, investigate traffic accidents, deliver civil process paperwork, as well as a host of other duties.

Patrol

Patrol Deputies are typically the first, and often the only, contact the general public has with law enforcement.

There are **15** uniformed deputies that make up the Patrol Division.

In 2022 these deputies conducted **3378** traffic stops, which resulted in **1349** citations and **1079** warnings for traffic violations, including **126** intoxicated people, **120** unlicensed drivers, **264** individuals driving under suspension, and **135** people without vehicle insurance.

One of the most visible duties of the Patrol Division is the patrolling of the unincorporated areas of the county. During 2022 deputies conducted **3305** area checks and extra patrols in the county.

The members of the patrol division are truly at the forefront of making Muscatine County safer for all its citizens.

Even though traffic is a priority to the deputies, they respond to many types of calls.






Civil Department



The Muscatine County Jail medical department is a team of 1 full time RN, 3 part time RN's, and is partnered by contract with Advanced Correctional Healthcare. ACH currently provides Muscatine County Jail with an on call medical provider 24/7 and 365 days to give medical orders to staff. This provider also comes to the jail once a week to see inmates who are in need of medical services. This provider sees approximately 3-4 patients each week. ACH also provides us with a mental health provider who currently works at the jail as a part-time Licensed Master Social Worker.

The Muscatine County Sherriff's Office Medical Department spends their time answering roughly 50 inmate sick calls weekly in regards to medical conditions that arise with inmates. Their daily work also consists of passing medically necessary medications to the approximately 120 inmates and facilitating 14 day assessments on inmate that will be housed in our facility for extended periods at a time. Our medical staff also works closely with the US Marshall Services & County Administration to schedule inmates for outside appointments when necessary & administers roughly 14 tuberculosis screenings a week for federal inmates. They administer monthly lab draws, weight assessments, and yearly vitals on all inmates in addition to various medical tests within the jail as needed on inmates. Yearly vaccinations for staff are also administered by our medical staff as needed.


Jail Diversion



Jail diversion had 181 people assigned to participate in this program. The county was able to benefit from 592 days of sentencing along with 4,538 hours of work.

The total benefit to the county was 4,538 hours of work or nearly 2 full time employees at 40 hours a week average.



The Jail Diversion Program is run by Officer Evelyn Van Est and designed for sentenced misdemeanants, and serves as an opportunity to place violators in a position to help the community through labor by performing community service work. Often times participants perform labor that includes general grounds keeping work. Common tasks include mowing, ditch cleaning, removal of illegal dumping, snow removal, painting, and assistance with recycling and sorting of materials.


Transports




